

Director's Note

Jach summer when I was a little girl, my "Grammy" would pack my sister and me up in the car, and we would travel the backroads of Indiana, Illinois, and Kentucky in search of our family's history.

We would wade through tall grass to find abandoned

tombstones that we would "chalk" to read inscriptions or epitaphs or spend hours in dusty courthouses looking through old records. (This was long before there were computerized records or ancestry.com!)

While it was important for Grammy to know names, dates of birth, and deaths, she wanted more. She wanted to learn the history of the people who make up our family. What was their life like, how did they persevere through difficult times, and how did their faith and traditions influence who they became? And how we in the present are a part of that story?

Today, you will glimpse into five lives of the 20,000 souls buried at the Old City Cemetery:

- An African-American Civil War nurse
- A young miner lost in West Virginia but given a unique burial here at the OCC
- A doctor who led Lynchburg through another pandemic in an earlier time (the Spanish Flu epidemic)
- The first African-American elected to public office in Virginia
- A young woman who had dreams for the future but whose life came to a tragic ending

Their lives impacted not only their own families but our Lynchburg community. I hope their stories will help us see the challenges we have faced in the past, more clearly see our present, and walk confidently towards the future.

I loved those trips with my Grammy. I discovered more about my family's past, and it told me just a bit about myself. As you experience our stories, I hope you sense bits of your history and how you shape your family and our community.



Teresa Harris

Teresa Harris (author of Samuel Kelso) is a poet, playwright, actor, and director. She has written, produced, and directed seven original stage plays including From the Valley to the Peak and Still Climbing, The Quincy Armstrong Show, In Remembrance of MLK: From Beyond Vietnam to the Dream, and The Day is Past and Gone: A Trilogy of Slave Life series at Poplar Forest. A strong proponent of community activism, Teresa currently serves on the boards of several non-profit organizations including Building Bridges Productions, Inc., Many Voices One Community, and Endstation. Martha Spence Edley (1826-1920)

Original Script Writer: Catherine Ann Taylor Current Version: Claire Wittman Performed by Gloria Simon (evenings) & Libby Jefferson (matinee)

Martha was born into slavery in Amelia County. Described as mixed race and small of stature, she was sold at age 24 in 1849 to a young lawyer named David Edley Spence of Lynchburg to care for his wife Sarah and infant child Mary. While enslaved, Martha accompanied Sarah and Mary on many trips by boat down the James River to Powhatan County to visit Sarah's mother. She met and married, after permission was granted by their owners, orge Edley, an enslaved man owned by Mr. Spence's uncle, David Rittenhouse Edley. Baby Adeline was born in 1853, Hannah in 1857, and a baby boy in 1861. Martha and George buried all three of the children before any of them reached their seventh birthdays. Martha was left alone when George died in 1862.

During the Civil War, Lynchburg became a city of hospitals. Martha went regularly with her mistress, Sarah Spence, to the hospital at Main and Sixth Streets to help care for the wounded and dying soldiers. She remained with the Spence family through the generations, caring for Sarah's daughter Mary, and then for Mary's daughters. She died in 1920 at age 94, while still living with one of those daughters, Elizabeth Spence Gish, on Rivermont Avenue. She is buried with her husband and three children in Old City Cemetery. Her newspaper death announcement—despite all her personal loss and faithfulness to the Spence family—read only, "Colored Woman Buried."

Dewey Bryant (1898-1921)

Dewey Bryant was the fourth of six children born to Ada Love Bryant and William Littleberry Bryant. His father was known as "Trotting Billy," because he moved his family around so much. Dewey grew up in Nelson County and moved to West Virginia to work in the coal mines. He joined the United Mine Workers of America and died at age 23 near the end of the battle of Blair Mountain, West Virginia, in Logan County. Blair Mountain was the largest labor uprising in U.S. history, fought with machine guns over conditions for workers in the mines.

For five days from late August to early September 1921, some 10,000 armed miners confronted 3,000 lawmen who were backed by coal mine operators during the miners' attempt to unionize the southwestern West Virginia coalfields. Dewey and a friend Keenis Williamson made a push to take out a gun nest held by the lawmen. Both were killed, Keenis by multiple machine gun rounds, and Dewey by one shot to the heart. The battle ended after approximately one million rounds were fired and the West Virginia Army National Guard intervened by presidential order. Dewey's body, left out on the field for some time, was retrieved by his fellow union members so that it could be sent home to his father and stepmother in Lynchburg.

Dr. Mosby Perrow (1875-1943)

In 1918, a deadly influenza pandemic swept the world, carried at first by troop movements during World War I. Many governments around the world, local and national, chose to downplay information about the deadliness of the disease so as not to cause a panic. Spain did not: the government in Madrid chose to provide information on the numbers of deaths, and as their dubious reward, the disease became known worldwide as the Spanish Influenza.

Dr. Mosby Perrow, born in Campbell County and educated at Washington & Lee, was the Chief Health Officer in 1918. He followed the example of the Spanish government, and in conjunction with then-Mayor Royston Jester Jr. provided the citizens of Lynchburg with all the information they needed. Within days of the time the influenza began claiming victims in Lynchburg in early October 1918, Dr. Perrow issued directives about ventilation and masks for forward facing workers. Schools and other gathering places were closed soon after. Students at Lynchburg High School missed 40 days of school and had to make up the time on the weekends and in the summer of 1919. By November 1918, the number of victims began declining. Although an estimated 250 people died in the city, the toll was much less horrific than in other places where information had been withheld. He died of heart issues during the height of another war, in 1943.

Samuel Kelso (ca. 1825-1880)

Although he was born enslaved and only lived to be fifty-five, Samuel Kelso had earned many titles and held various positions such as politician, school teacher, and mail agent by the time he passed away in 1880. In 1867, Kelso was elected to represent Lynchburg and Campbell County in the Virginia Constitutional Convention of 1867-1868. During the convention, he introduced Virginia's first resolution supporting free public education for children of all races and advocated for strong public and non-segregated schools. He was a man well ahead of his time, as this idea would not be made into law until the 1950s.

By 1870, Kelso had become one of Lynchburg's first African American school teachers and taught at the Freedmen's Bureau Camp Davis School alongside Jacob Yoder. His teaching career, however, was rather short, and in 1871, he was appointed by the Postmaster General to superintend the transportation of mail between railroad depots in Lynchburg. Despite being slandered by the newspapers and his abilities being doubted by many in the city, Kelso held this position until his passing.

Although his years of freedom were limited, Samuel Kelso forged an amazing legacy during that time and worked diligently to better his community and the education of the city's youth. He is buried at Old City Cemetery, but the location of his grave and whatever marker it had has been lost to history. However, there is a Virginia historical marker documenting his life in front of the Lynchburg City Schools administrative building at 915 Court Street.

Minnie Coles Shoumarker (1888-1915)

Minnie Lee Coles was born to Marion Frost Coles and Emily Sligh Coles as a late-in-life baby when her father was 40 and her mother was 43. She was the seventh and youngest.

Minnie married Henry John Schumacher December 31, 1911, at age 23, in Lynchburg, Virginia. Henry was a seaman with the United States Navy stationed on the USS North Carolina in Norfolk, Virginia., and he met Minnie on a visit to Lynchburg. The young couple eventually made their way to Chicago. Minnie went alone to visit family in Lynchburg, and Henry described her as "not well" at the time.

On July 13, 1915, Minnie, age 27, Harry Watson, age 31, of Lynchburg, and James Cochran, age 23, of Norfolk went row boating on the James River. The boat capsized, filling with water but never sinking. Even though Cochran could swim, all three drowned. Minnie's body was found after a nine-hour search.

One newspaper article describes the three in a hired rowboat "talking" and "having a gay time" before it turned them out. A witness theorized that if the occupants had just held onto the boat they could have been rescued.

Minnie was buried in the family plot at the Old City Cemetery with an impressive gravestone carved with a dove symbolizing resurrection, innocence and peace that reads, "Thy life was beauty, truth, good, and love."

Henry was never notified of his wife's death. He got no response when he inquired after her whereabouts from her family. He only found out she was dead when he reached out to Police Chief Seay.

Heritage Interpreters

(Tour Guides, in order of appearance)

James Scurry (1820–1869) - Brought to life in our show by Ted Kraje, Mr. Scurry was a Master StoneMason who worked laying cobblestone for the City of Lynchburg, and likely constructed the walls around his own family plot here in the cemetery. He was from Galway, Ireland, and married Lynchburg woman Martha Constance (see below). He was a member of the Odd Fellows, a quirky secret society not unlike the FreeMasons. He died in 1869 of unknown causes.

Martha Constance Scurry (1824-1896) - Portrayed by Angie Krage, Ms. Scurry was a Lynchburg native who lived at 600 Monroe Street. Wife of Irishman James Scurry, she had at least 8 children, who were laid to rest with her in the family plot. She attended St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and "kept house." She was said to have an impulsive nature, and died in 1896 of "epidemic dysentery," outliving her husband by 27 years.

Rio Grand Roberts, Jr. (1900 - 1963) - Portrayed by Elijah Smith, Mr. Roberts was a Merchant Marine and a dapper man in his day. He grew up in a loving home on Polk St. with deep roots in Lynchburg. Genealogical studies reveal that he was related to Edward Spencer, husband to the famous local Harlem Renaissance poet, Anne Spencer. He died of unknown causes while traveling in Puerto Rico.

Nannie Laura Burnett Bagby (1869 - 1952) - Though she lived a simple, hard working life at the Lynchburg Cotton Mill, Ms. Bagby's long lifespan saw major cultural and social changes. To list a few, Nannie witnessed the invention of the telephone, electric lights, radio, automobiles, and air travel. She lived through four major wars, the Great Depression, and Prohibition. She married John Henry Bagby and lived on Oakley Ave. She is portrayed for our performance by Merry Barth.

Cora Lee Burks Roberts (1872-1921) - A native Lynchburg resident, Ms. Roberts was a homemaker and devoted wife and mother from Polk Street. During her short but fulfilling life, she lived through the Jim Crow era, saw the invention of the Ford Model T, the start and finish of World War 1, the sinking of the Titanic, and Women's Suffrage, though African Americans like herself would not have full access to voting rights for many decades. She died of cervical cancer in her home in 1921. She is portrayed in our performance by Olivia Green.

Mary Tilden Doniphan (1849 - 1897) - Revived by Mary Massie for our Candlelight Tours, Ms. Doniphan lived a tragically short, but meaningful life as a teacher in the Lynchburg school system. From a prominent family, her grandfather had been a Lynchburg Mayor, and was instrumental in bringing water to the city of Lynchburg in 1825. She attended Court Street Methodist and experienced Lynchburg become a hospital town during the Civil War. She died of consumption at the age of 25.

Elizabeth Ann Philips Akers (1815 - 1842) - Elizabeth Martin plays Elizabeth Ann Phillips, one of six children of Mary and Benjamin Phillips. She married Peter Garret Akers, a plasterer, and had two children. However, just one year after the birth of her second child, she passed at the young age of 27 in her father's home after eight months of suffering from a painful illness.

Cora Mina Brooks Mayberry (1890 - 1918) - Ms. Cora Mayberry, played by Melora Kordos, grew up with her twin sister Minnie Davies at the Miller Female Orphan Asylum, which was located on Lakeside Drive where the Plaza now stands. Though an orphan, her memories of the Miller Home were happy ones. She married William Robert Jr, and died at only 28 years of age from the Spanish Flu Epidemic.
